

Maria is originally from Ecuador, South America so we expected her to be bilingual, but found out very quickly that she speaks four languages! Maria moved to the United States when she was 18, attended college, and then joined the US Navy at the age of 22. During her military service, she had the opportunity to travel the world, learn many skills, and we suspect that she has many great stories to tell.

After 14 years in the Navy, Maria decided that she wanted to be present to her children 100% of the time and was honorably discharged. Today Maria is a wife, and a mother to three little boys, who loves Jesus Christ and helping others. Now that all her children are attending school, she finds herself with a little more time on her hands and wants to use it to serve others.

Maria was specifically drawn to CARITAS because she remembered a mission trip experience when she was in high school. During this trip, Maria volunteered with the Carmelite Sisters of Saint Teresa and helped as a missionary in the needy community of Guasmo where she taught children to read and write. The lasting impact of that ministry experience led her to find our family and want others to have a similar experience.

Maria will be volunteering remotely from Jacksonville Florida, assisting with social media posting, and supporting our communications team. She hopes to join a mission trip to Uganda with her family in the near future. Welcome Maria!

## Spotlight on Children in Need

These girls have both had sponsorships in the past but their sponsors are sadly unable to continue supporting them. They are both now in desperate need of a new sponsor if they are to have a real chance in life.

Specioza has recently lost her sponsor and is in great need of a new one in order to continue living and learning in a boarding school.

Several years ago, her father abandoned the family and Specioza was taken care of by her mother who was mentally ill and suffered from seizures very often. Specioza and her mother lived with her grandmother who did her best to take care of them. They have always been struggling to survive and occasionally, they did not have enough to eat.

Unfortunately, Specioza's mother, Annet who sometimes would walk around the streets selling sweet bananas, had suffered a seizure, spent two weeks in a coma, and died. Specioza is now back to living with her peasant grandmother who cannot afford to send her to school.

She is in sixth grade having one year to finish Primary Level. We are hoping that Specioza can be back in boarding school so that she can live in a stable environment and have her basic needs met.

Specioza particularly loves Social Studies, and very much hopes to be able to finish her education. We are praying that through a sponsorship, she will have a chance at a bright future.

To help Specioza go to boarding school, she will need

- \$120/month from one sponsor
- o or \$60/month from two sponsors.

Lilian's family is in a very difficult situation. Her father passed away when the children were very young, and Lilian's mother is HIV positive. Because of her health conditions and the loss of her husband, Lilian's mother cannot manage to provide for her children alone, although she works very hard to feed and clothe her children by digging in people's gardens.


As a growing girl, Lilian needs food, safety, hygiene products, and most importantly, an education. To be properly provided for, Lilian requires a boarding school scholarship. Without a sponsorship, Lilian will be forced to live her life fetching water, gathering wood, and helping her mother dig in gardens - which will perpetuate the cycle of poverty she grew up in. Additionally, it puts her in a precarious position where she can easily be taken advantage of for a simple meal.

Her previous report cards were very good! She even won prizes twice at her school for academic excellence. Lilian is a very loving girl and has demonstrated good leadership abilities. Lilian's desire is to become a midwife so that she can help save more mothers from dying during childbirth, and so that she can become self-reliant and support her family.

Due to her current family situation, the school is now keeping her as we try our best to look for another sponsor but the favor may not last for more than the next term.

For Lilian to remain at the boarding school, she'll need

- \$120/month from one sponsor
- or \$60/month from two sponsors.
